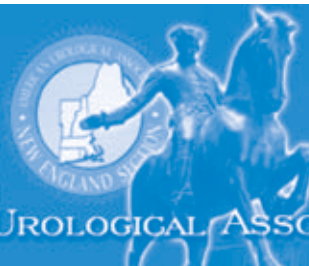

Highlights of the BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING, September 28, 2006

Report of the President

The Board nominated Dr. Robert D. Oates to succeed Dr. Kevin Loughlin on the Editorial Board of *The Journal of Urology*.

Report of the Secretary

Dr. Kevin Loughlin reported that the Section presently had 344 Active members, 198 Senior members, 21 Associate Members, 3 Honorary members, 12 Affiliate Members and 86 Candidate members for a total of 664 members. It was noted that 87% of the residents in the Section are AUA members; Dr. Jumper will write a follow-up invitation to the remaining residents, copying their Program Directors.

The 2006 Annual Meeting has the highest pre-registration recorded, and pending onsite registrations could be the widest-attended Annual Meeting ever. New programming added over the past two years, included the 2006 Young Urologist Program as well as the AUA Instructional Course to be presented by Drs. Pearle and Nakada. After discussion of industry symposia at the annual meeting, the Board voted to allow the Scientific Program Chair(s) and President to review proposals for industry symposia and to approve the topic, as well as the faculty, to ensure high-quality symposia in keeping with the academic integrity of the Section.

Treasurer's Report

Financial reports, ending August 31, 2006, recorded Section assets of \$874,483. The reconciliation portion of the Statement of Financial Position showed beginning cash of \$601,352 and an operating surplus of \$273,131. Total receipts were \$426,143 and total disbursements were \$153,012. The 2007 operating budget projected a \$20,000 annual operating surplus, compared with a budgeted \$28,090 operating surplus for 2006.

Dr. Eyre noted that the investment account was doing extremely well, and that the growth reflected was largely investment income, rather than additional transfers from the cash accounts. Whenever possible, additional cash should be moved into the investment account. The current investment policy of keeping one and one half times estimated annual operating expenses liquid was reiterated and it was voted to grant the Treasurer discretionary power to move funds in excess of one and one half times annual operating expenses into the investment account.

Report of the President-Elect

The Board voted to accept the AUA's offer to present a Coding Seminar at the 2007 Annual Section Meeting, and to request a half-day program only with no financial obligation for the Section. A special office staff registration fee for the 2007 Annual Meeting of \$50

will be offered for those who wished to attend just the Coding Seminar with a special one-day badge allowing access to the Exhibit Hall.

In addition, the Board voted to reduce the general Allied Health Registration fee for the 2007 Annual Meeting to \$100 to encourage overall allied health attendance, particularly as the meeting is in Boston. This would include all scientific and social events except the President's Banquet, which would require a separate fee.

Reports of New England Section Committees

Local Arrangements Committee

Dr. Anthony Caldamone reported on the status of the social activities, including the Friday evening "Night at the Tony's" Reception followed by a production of *The Cherry Orchard* at the Trinity Repertory Theatre in Providence, and the President's Banquet in the Rotunda of the Rhode Island State House.

By-Laws Committee

Dr. Kevin Loughlin reported that work was being done to formalize the relationship between the Section's 501(c)(3) and 501(c)(6) corporations. At present, the boards of both are identical. Dr. Loughlin noted that yearly dues will be paid to the C6 Corporation, and then the C6 will give 80% of the dues to the C3 entity to conduct Sectional operations.

Scientific Program Committee

In the absence of Chair Dr. Moritz Hansen, Dr. Jumper reported on the final scientific program; the Board commented on the strength of the 2006 program and approved the continuation of the simultaneous session format, including sessions for moderated posters.

Reports of Representatives to AUA

Board of Directors

Dr. Babayan reported that the AUA is now comprised of three separate organizations, a C6, a C3, and the new AUA Foundation which was created to take the place of AFUD. The new Foundation is very different from AFUD and seeks to raise funds to support education initiatives in no-lose situations. All monies have been transferred from AFUD to AUA Foundation. The Foundation was organized under a completely new set of By-Laws.

The AUA, as a whole, is worth \$100 million, and a recent review of the investment strategy resulted in a change of investment advisors to Vanguard. On a sad note, the incoming AUA Secretary, Joe Segura, passed away, and following an emergency session, the

AUA Board selected Dr. Bob Flannigan as the new AUA Secretary. Glen Preminger will take over as the head of the AUA Office of Education, and the Jim Gallagher Conference Room will be dedicated.

The AUA Board agreed to make declarative statement that the AUA was opposed to a two-tiered system of urological training. The Guidelines Committee is working on guidelines that are compatible with / mirror European urologic guidelines.

Locally, the AUA is reaching out to improve relations with the Sections. Dr. Babayan had been appointed Chair of a committee charged to work with the Section Secretaries to improve the AUA/Sectional relationship.

By-Laws Committee

Dr. Loughin provided the minutes of the most recent AUA By-Laws Committee Meeting and noted that some of the membership categories are being compressed.

History Committee

Dr. Mark Sigman reported that the 2006 exhibit at the annual meeting was a success; the AUA is offering the opportunity to host portions of the exhibits at Section meetings. The estimated cost would be ten to twelve thousand and it was agreed that this would be of interest if it could be done with subsidization from industry, as was the case at the national meeting.

Journal of Urology Editorial Board

The journal is now being published by Elsevier, and seeking to expand into an international market. Submission to publication time was approximately 6 months.

Old Business

Dr. Loughlin noted that a proposed set of By-laws for the C6 had been distributed and would need to be approved by the C6 Board at a subsequently convened meeting.

Board members reviewed a request for funding from the IVU, and while agreeing that its mission is important, the consensus was that this is more of an AUA matter and more appropriately supported on the national level.

New Business

Various optional nominations to AUA Committees were reviewed and it was noted that all were reappointments except a recommendation that Dr. Liam Hurley be appointed to the AUA Audio Visual Committee to replace outgoing Chair Dr. Ann Gormley.

The Board voted to recommend that Dr. Catherine Schwender and Dr. Mark Plante be renewed as delegates to the Resident Fellow Section and Alternate Delegate to the Young Physicians Section, respectively.

Carlos Estrada, M.D. named NE-AUA 2006-2007 Post Residency Research Award Winner

The New England Section of the American Urological Association is proud to announce that Dr. Carlos R. Estrada of Children's Hospital in Boston, Massachusetts has been selected as the recipient of the 2006-2007 New England Section AUA Post Residency Research Award, for his research proposal entitled "Proliferation and Apoptosis Regulated by Nuclear Localization of the Epidermal Growth Factor Receptor in Bladder Smooth Muscle." Dr. Estrada is a graduate of Wright State University School of Medicine and the College of the Holy Cross. His mentor is Dr. Michael R. Freeman of Children's Hospital in Boston. Dr. Estrada will receive a \$10,000 Post Residency Award from the Section.

In 2003, the New England Section, to further its mission in the area of research and education, instituted a Post Residency Research Grant. The Award, up to \$10,000, is given annually to a member or candidate member of the New England Section and is funded through an unrestricted educational grant offered by Astellas Pharma US. Applicants must be no more than 10 years post-residency and must be serving as fellows or junior faculty. Funds are used to support a research program in basic or clinical sciences related to Urology.

To comply with tax regulations, the section membership dues will be paid to the C-6 corporation which will then transfer 80 percent of the annual dues this year to the C-3 corporation. The percentage of dues transferred will be determined on a yearly basis.
